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D-Day, 80 years later

This year marks the 80th anniversary of the D-Day landings and invasion of Normandy during World War II. The City of Alexandria has shared a sister city relationship with the city of Caen, Normandy's capital, since 1991. As part of Alexandria's participation in Sister Cities International, the Alexandria-Caen Sister City Committee promotes educational and cultural exchanges between Alexandria and Caen, France. Alexandria's 14th Annual D-Day Commemoration is planned for this Sunday between 1 and 4 p.m. on Market Square as part of that exchange.

On June 6, 1944, more than 160,000 Allied troops invaded Normandy, France, gaining a significant foothold in continental Europe. The city of Caen was the center of some of the heaviest fighting after the Allies landed on nearby beaches, and the Battle for Caen raged from June 6 to Aug. 6, 1944. When the fighting ended, 80% of the city was destroved. It took 18 years to rebuild the city. More than 9,000 Allied soldiers were killed or wounded during the initial invasion. Their sacrifice played an invaluable role in the Allied victory over Adolf Hitler and the Axis Powers.

Alexandria's commemoration program includes live

period swing music by Modern Swing Collective, World War II reenactors, swing dancers, history displays, community tables and performances by the U.S. Army Fife and Drum Corps, and the Alexandria Citizens Band. The commemoration also features a short formal ceremony with the mayor and city officials, military representatives and embassy delegates from Allied nations.

Alexandria offers a second D-Day program at the Lyceum on June 6 at 7 p.m., the actual

80th anniversary of D-Day. U.S. Army Historian, Kim Bernard Holien, Ph.D. presents "How Patton's Ghost Army Beat Hitler." This year, more than 80 years after their mission, soldiers of the "Ghost Army" received the highest civilian honor of the United States, the Congressional Gold Medal, for their clever tactics outwitting the enemy in the most unlikely ways.

Their unconventional tactics included inflatable convoys, sound effects, fake radio shows and misinformation.

Come and learn how the Allies weaved the web that held the German 15th Army at Calais, ensuring victory in Normandy. Lecture tickets are \$10 and are available at shop.alexandriava. gov. A wine and dessert reception follows the lecture.
