OSTP School Year Update:

Current 24-25 School Year Enrollment: 1349

We are currently offering out-of-school time programming at (10) afterschool locations, which include (2) specialty programs (Youth Achieving Greatness and TR Achieving Greatness) and (3) LINK Club locations for a total of (13) programming opportunities.

Partnerships & Collaborations:

Partners such as ACPS, the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA), 4-H Cooperative Extension, Upcycle, Momentum Collective Inc., and the Buddie Ford Nature Center provide specialized programming, academic support, and enrichment activities at OSTP Power-On afterschool locations.

The OSTP Committee is updating the OSTP Standard Operating Procedures and the OSTP Staff Manual. They are also revising the OSTP Site Monitoring Observation Form to ensure the program aligns with quality standards that enhance our services.

Plans are underway for the Summer 2025 program. Pre-registration will open on Sunday, February 2, 2025, and close on Friday, February 7, 2025. Open registration will begin online on Wednesday, February 19, 2025, at 9:00 a.m., with in-person registration starting on Thursday, February 20, 2025.

Program Wrap-ups:

The Nannie J. Lee Recreation Center kicked off
October with Halloween excitement, offering a month
of activities including Fang-Tastic Fridays, a
Haunted House, Mummy Walk, and Halloween
Parade. Our little goblins enjoyed a fun mix of indoor

• December 15:

- The Fee Classes and Camps team will host an End-of-Session Dance Recital at the Lee Center Auditorium. The event will showcase dancers ages 3–11 from 10 different ballet classes.
- o RPCA will host the Alexandria Holiday Invitational at 2 p.m. at Alexandria City High School. The event will feature cheerleading teams from Alexandria and the surrounding area.
- **December 18**: Chinquapin Recreation Center will host a *Gingerbread Cookie Decorating* event, inviting participants of all ages to enjoy a cozy, festive evening filled with holiday activities.

Special Features:

- The Sports Section interviewed 11 high school students to join the team as Youth Basketball Officials for the department's winter basketball league. The high school students will be hired as Recreation Leaders and be trained by a certified officiating company to officiate 8U games in the league. This is the second year of this initiative and if all students complete the process, there will be 14 students officiating for the 2025 season.
- Buddie Ford Nature Center partnered with Transportation and Environmental Services and the Office of Climate Action to offer MWEE programming to ACPS 7th-grade students. Each group created a station based on the Watersheds curriculum, with the

nature center focusing on Invasive Species. Over six days, the program reached over 800 students.

- Chinquapin is launching the Coffee with a Manager program to strengthen connections between staff and patrons. Local coffee shops are partnering to provide donations, creating a welcoming space for open dialogue and feedback. The initiative also aims to reinvigorate our advisory board, ensuring community input in decision-making.
- The Lee Center has completed phase 2 of the lighting upgrades for the Auditorium. This upgrade began in 2022 and has now been completed. This upgrade is the 2nd upgrade to the 400-seat auditorium which recently had the Sound System replaced.

- The Nature Center welcomed **Gabika Watson**, a seasonal environmental educator, to the Buddie Ford team.
- The Minnie Howard Aquatics Facility welcomed **Megan Bates** and **James Morrison**, full-time head lifeguards, to the team.
- The Chinquapin team was honored at Senior Services of Alexandria's Volunteer Appreciation Reception on November 12. The Chinquapin staff have opened the doors to the Meals on Wheels program for all of 2024 following a fire at their previous meal facility.

In October, the Beautification Commission hosted its annual Awards Ceremony, celebrating exceptional beautification efforts across the city. The winners were honored in the following categories:

- Excellence in Architecture: Recognizing outstanding new construction, additions, improvements, and historic renovations, awards were presented to Douglas MacArthur Elementary, Potomac Yard Station, and the United States Patent and Trademark Office.
- Community Beautification: Celebrating individual or group efforts that enhance the community, awards went to Canal Center Plaza, Simpson Park Demonstration Garden, and the Winkler Botanical Preserve.
- Commercial Beautification: Recognizing commercial properties that contribute to the city's beautification, awards were given to the Blueprint for Peace Mural, Eisenhower East Community Park, and Port City Brewing Company.
- Residential Beautification: Nine families were recognized for their contributions to the city's beautification through their impressive efforts to enhance their properties.

The ceremony highlighted the dedication and creativity of individuals, groups, and organizations that continue to make Alexandria a more beautiful place to live, work, and visit.

City Gateway Landscape Improvements

Project Manager: Oscar Mendoza, Division Chief

The Natural Resources Division continues its efforts to manage invasive species in various areas across the city. The primary target at this time is porcelain berry. We are currently cutting vines and treating stems. As we transition to winter weather, the division will pause foliar treatments and shift to the cutting season, focusing on invasive species that are in partial or full dormancy.

In late October, RPCA Park Services partnered with the Alexandria Beautification Commission to bring an extra touch of charm to six of Alexandria's 13 primary gateways. This is the first phase of a broader initiative to transform these key entry points into vibrant, welcoming landmarks for residents and visitors alike.

Last spring, all 13 gateways were updated with brand-new entrance signs featuring Alexandria's iconic ship logo. Building on that progress, the fall landscaping enhancements have brought these sites to life with colorful, native plants. The new additions include a beautiful mix of flowering perennials such as Coneflowers, Catmint, and Bluestar, along with grasses like Switchgrass and Bluestem, and shrubs like Witch-alder and Sumac. These plantings not only enhance the aesthetics but also support pollinators, birds, and other wildlife, aligning with Alexandria's Eco-City goals.

URBAN FORESTRY

Project Manager: Phil Jubert, Urban Forest Manager

- Planting Season Update: Due to drought conditions our fall planting season has been cut short. Scheduled fall plantings are being moved to spring 2025. Groups and individuals scheduled to receive a tree are in the process of being contacted. Although the City waters trees (using a combination of vendors and internal resource), we still need Mother Nature to contribute.
- Event Highlight: Urban Forestry spoke at 4 locations of the "Child & Family Network Center" in Alexandria, teaching preschoolers about trees and leading them through a planting activity.
- **Better Equipped:** Urban Forestry received a new landscape truck with dump bed. This truck increases our internal workload capacities and lessens our need on more expensive contract labor.
- Looking ahead: Winter is the best time to prune trees. During the growing season, we target deadwood and nuisance limbs. During the winter, we expand our prescription into more extensive crown cleaning, which improves tree vigor and aesthetics. For the next 3 months, we will have a heavy workload in our city parks for comprehensive crown cleaning.

Month of Service City Events

Project Manager: Lucresha Murphy-Tate, PARKnership Manager

During October, employees participated in an inaugural 'Month of Service,' an initiative celebrating the City's 275th Anniversary. In partnership with the Department of Human Resources, the Month of Service introduced staff to new neighborhoods, connected them with residents, and highlighted year-round opportunities to give back to our community.

This first Month of Service not only empowered City staff to make a personal impact but also fostered a sense of civic pride and connection to our neighborhoods. As part of the initiative, PARKnership hosted three clean-up events at Fort Ward Park, Windmill Hill Park, and Potomac Yard Park with a total of 74 participants, contributing 148 volunteer hours.





Dark Sky Certification for Athletic Fields Project Managers: Daniel Unkle, Urban Planner III

In August 2024, both Francis C. Hammond Middle School and Jefferson Houston K-8 School were awarded DarkSky Phase II Certification for the newly installed outdoor sports field lighting. This certification was granted following a successful field inspection, which confirmed that the schools' lighting systems fully comply with the criteria outlined in the DarkSky Approved Outdoor Sports Lighting Program Version 1.3 guidelines. The certification process ensures that outdoor lighting at the schools minimizes light pollution and preserving the heritage of dark skies. By meeting these standards, both sites have demonstrated their commitment to sustainability and environmental stewardship, contributing to the effort to reduce light pollution while promoting energy efficiency and responsible lighting practices.





JOSEPH HENSLEY PARK RENOVATION

Project Managers: Bethany Znidersic, Division Chief, Park Services & Mitch Dillion, DPI

Joseph Hensley Park is being renovated to implement the community-based recommendations of the Citywide Park Plan. The park will be renovated in two phases and Phase I includes improvements to the lower and upper diamond fields, parking lots, a new playground, replacement picnic shelter, new restroom building, maintenance yard, and stormwater management systems. Construction of the park is shaping up with the installation of the playground, lower diamond field, and upper synthetic turf diamond field. Work will continue for a few more months and the community is reminded that the construction area is closed. The City looks forward to welcoming park users back to Hensley in spring 2025.





PATRICK HENRY OUTDOOR FACILITIES CONSTRUCTION Project Managers: Jack Browand, Deputy Director and Ana Vicinanzo, Urban Planner

Construction on Patrick Henry Phase II is coming to a close and the sitework is anticipated to be complete in December 2024. The parking lot and site circulation improvements are complete. The athletic field surface is currently being installed.





PARK MAINTENANCE

Our team has been inspecting all trails in each Park District for a condition assessment to prioritize the repairs in the upcoming months. We have also been working on winter weather preparations and began the installation of our snow stakes at our school parking lots identifying curb stops, lay down areas, sidewalks, and bus drop off locations.



Additional athletic field maintenance training occurred in the later half of October that included all management staff.

As a joint venture with our Planning Department, we were able to provide guidance and Leadership to support the rehabilitation of our Potomac Greens Pergola.
